## Favorite Authors Named

H. G. Wells Has 'Silly Streak'—Ernest Poole 'a Promising American Writer.'

Galworthy came in for considerable favorable comment under the subject, "Favorite Authors," at the lecture given by Mrs. Anthony French Merrill at Hotel Blackstone Monday morning. He was described as "rich and varied in his writings, vital in his grasp and interesting in his methods."

"No one can equal him in group portrayal," said Mrs. Merrill. "He believes every group has an inherent moral."  
Books, plays, poems and commentaries are to his credit as a writer. "Everyone will read his latest book, 'The White Monkey,' the speaker said."  
Joseph Conrad was named as a favorite author, "Adventure, other romances, times and seasons, beauty, romance and exaltation," are in his names, according to Mrs. Merrill.  
H. G. Wells, with his enormous body of work, was inevitably named. "Brilliant, bold, interesting, active," were characteristics the speaker accorded him, "but he has a silly streak," she said, "which crops out when you least expect it."  
Arnold Bennett has done a large body of brilliant work," continued Mrs. Merrill. "No one has greater facility, or such humor." He loves the world and its prosperity too much, lacks a selfless love for humanity, or righteousness or even art, in Mrs. Merrill's opinion.  
Bernard Shaw, Edith Wharton, Margaret Deland, were others named. Ernest Poole is a promising young American writer, in the opinion of Mrs. Merrill. His latest book, "The Avalanche," shows a strong sense of beauty, she said during her review of the novel.

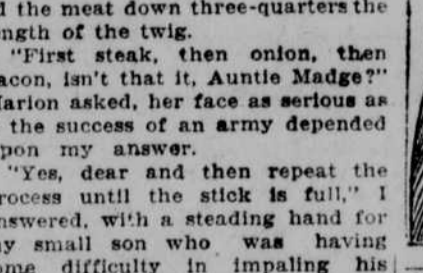
Why Madge Strove to Keep Junior From Lee Chow.
