

# McGraw Hurls Pennsylvania Eleven to 20 to 0 Victory Over Cornell

## Quaker Back's Passing Defeats Ithica Crew

Douglas, Thayer, McKinley Aid Teammates in Down-Coach Dobie's Machine.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 27.—Rea McGraw, a southpaw with control, pitched Pennsylvania to a noble 20 to 0 victory over Cornell in their annual Thanksgiving day football struggle here this afternoon.

A southpaw with control is a rarity, as anybody will tell you, even in football. These "crooked arm" flingers are generally as wild as hawks, no matter where you find 'em. Being southpaw is what makes 'em wild, Ruble Waddell, Ruble Marquard, Napoleon Bonaparte, Emperor William and all the other great southpaws of history were wild.

Rea McGraw is the first one that has come along in years with control. He can pitch them through a knot hole. Also, he has a nice change of pace.

This afternoon he hurled a fast straight one to G. Lansing Thayer of the famous Pennsylvania Thayers, you know—then pitched a neat slow curve to Jesse Douglas. What he was flinging was forward passes, of course. You must have guessed that. This change of pace was highly disconcerting to the Cornell boys. They seemed to be laying back trying to wait McGraw out, and get their bases on balls, or something to that effect. Anyway, they didn't seem to have any theory of defense against McGraw's pitching, they didn't even try to hunt.

McGraw pitched to G. Lansing Thayer over a distance of fifty feet to be turned around and fall flat on his face to make a touchdown.

That was on the first one. When he pitched the slow curve to Jesse Douglas, Jesse had to run about 15 yards to Cornell's home plate. Stranah how baseball will crop into this football story. It must be the lingering influence of Rea McGraw's southpaw slinging.

Rea McGraw is captain of the Penn team, and plays plenty of halfback. His pitching today was well supported not only by Jesse, without his home, and G. Lansing Thayer, who normally is a substitute, but also by Ed McKinley, the Penn tackle, who is the local entry for whatever distinction there may be in that all-American thing.

## University of Florida's Efforts at Breaking Up Passes Defeats Drake

AINSVILLE, Fla., Nov. 27.—Ability of the University of Florida's "fighting gators" to break up efforts at aerial passing by the "Bulldogs of Drake university, combined with the telling effects of Florida's balmy weather, proved the undoing of the visitors, who were defeated here today, 10 to 0. The game was marked by brilliant playing of Dick Brown, flashy open field runner.

It was Newton's toe and Brown's running that scored Florida's 10 points.

Neither team was able to score during the first half of the game, although the ball was repeatedly sent from one end of the field to the other. Both elevens started the second half with determination written into every play, Drake putting the ball into play and holding Florida for several plays.

The smashing work of Newton and Jones, however, soon battered down the visitors' defense.

After working the ball well toward Drake's goal line, Newton stepped back and booted Florida's first three-point score, a beautifully placed field goal. Soon afterward Jones pulled a Drake pass from the air and raced across her goal line for a touchdown, Newton adding the extra point, making the score 10 to 0, and it stood this way until the end.

Drake's efforts, however, were not without threats, for they staged a powerful drive in the third period that carried the ball within easy reaching distance of the Florida goal. They were held, though, after at-

tempting two forward passes, Newton saving the day by grabbing one only three yards from the Florida goal line and rushing back 25 yards with the ball.

Florida again threatened to score in this period, when Chaplin picked a Drake pass out of the air and carried the ball to within three feet of the westerners' goal line, only to lose it when an attempted pass was grounded over the line.

The game was marked by brilliant work on the part of Florida's back-field stars, Newton, Jones and Brown, and Middelkauf, who was injected into the line for a brief period, and also by the work of Williams, Goldstein and Norton in the line.

For Drake, Captain Orebrough and Sparks were the particular stars.

Statistics of the game showed that Florida gained eight first downs against seven for Drake, the "Gators" also gaining 173 1/2 yards to Drake's 125 1/2, while Florida was penalized for 35 yards against 15 yards for Drake.

## NOTRE DAME TO PLAY STANFORD

Stanford University, Cal., Nov. 26.—Acceptance by Notre Dame of an invitation to meet the Stanford football team was received tonight by Dr. W. H. Barrow, athletic director of Stanford university. The acceptance leaves only the adjustment of minor details for the holding of the game at Pasadena on New Year's day.

Stanford, Dr. Barrow announced tonight would ask immediately for official sanction from the Pacific coast conference for holding of the game.

Coincident with the advice stating Notre Dame's willingness to play the western team, was Coach Glenn Warner's announcement here tonight that there was a strong possibility that Ernie Nevers, Stanford's star fullback, would be in the lineup. Nevers, who was injured recently and was unavailable for the Stanford-California game, was declared to be rounding into good shape and was expected to be recovered in time to play on New Year's day.

The faculty has taken no action in the case of Norman Cleveland, Stanford halfback, who was ruled ineligible for having participated in more than three years of varsity playing.

## MATHES TO PILOT BOOSTER CLUB
