

NEW BANDIT LAIR FOUND, WIDOW HELD

Woman Rearrested as Evidence at Second Rendezvous Indicates She Ruled Gang.

Latonia Henderson withstood cross-examination by Omaha police detectives so cleverly that she was released from custody at 9 a. m. Saturday.

She left with her pretty daughter, Virginia, 2, for the undertaker's establishment, to make arrangements for sending the body of the man she says was her husband, back to Kansas City, Kan.

He is the man killed by a bullet from a policeman's gun while he and two others were trying to break into the Piggy Wigly store at 3222 Farnam street, early Friday morning.

Suspicion Confirmed.

Scarcely had the woman left central police station when Ben Dahman, chief of detectives, received startling news from Detectives Planks and Killian, news that confirmed the first suspicion that this woman was a particularly clever member of the burglar gang and that she had nearly "put it over."

Detectives were dispatched to Heafy & Heafy morgue and there rearrested Mrs. Henderson.

At the police station the child was taken from her and she was placed in a cell. The baby may be given to juvenile authorities.

New Rendezvous Found.

The developments which caused the new arrest of the woman were the discovery of a little house at Fifth and Grover streets, believed to have been a second rendezvous of the gang, used in connection with the house at Forty-fifth and Frederick streets.

The newly discovered house is located near where two "cracked" safes stolen from Piggy-Wigly stores have been found.

In the house the detectives found a safe punch used for opening small safes, five bottles of narcotics and a quantity of goods believed to have been stolen, including perfumes, razors and cigars.

Blood—and Note.

But the most startling find was an army shoe pierced by two bullets and filled with fresh blood.

And a note, written in a woman's hand, addressed "Heafy & Heafy, 2311 Farnam street."

After addressing the note, the writer evidently changed her plan and decided to go in person to the mortuary.

Neighbors told detectives that the woman and a baby and two men drove away from the house in a battered touring car at 11 a. m. Friday.

Officers Are Commended.

It was a little after 11 when the woman burst into the mortuary.

looked upon the dead body and exclaimed to her child: "Good heavens, that is your daddy!"

After this outburst, however, she has shown no emotion over the death of the man she says was her husband.

Commendation came Saturday from Chief of Police Van Deusen for Motorcycle Officers H. McDermott and Eli Burke, who surprised the robbers. They were officially cited and given two days of vacation with pay.

From Kansas City, Kan., word was received that the dead man had a record there and was known as Henderson and also as William Barry. His Bertillon classification has been sent there for complete identification.

Officer Recovering.

Search of the house at Forty-fifth and Frederick streets which the gang frequented disclosed tools and some new merchandise believed to have been stolen.

Eli Burke, the officer struck by one of the robbers' shots is recovering.

Mrs. Henderson was the first person to be arrested as a result of the gun battle.

Mrs. Henderson was held for investigation after police listened to conflicting stories told by her regarding her actions Friday morning.

At first she said that her husband had come to Omaha but a few days ago from Kansas City. He had rented a home at Forty-fifth and Frederick streets. There they had lived ever since while Henderson searched for work.

On Thursday night two rough looking men came to their home and asked for Henderson. He left with them a short time later.

When Henderson failed to return home during the night, Mrs. Henderson, early in the forenoon, went in search of him.

During the questioning she became confused and mixed her stories. After having told the police that she had reversed her statement and said that she had eaten at home.

A watch stolen from the Noyes pharmacy, Fortieth and Dodge streets, a short time ago, was found in the pocket of the slain man.

In the basement of the house which was occupied by Henderson, under some newly turned earth, Detectives Hughes and Janda found a jimmy and a Community Chest pledge card. Henderson has been found. That they were wounded police are certain. The two men were seen to fall as they ran away. Then, in an alley, through which the bandits were traced, were seen spots of blood.

Demos to Back All Money Bills

Minority Leader of Congress Expects Little Legislation at Short Session.

Washington, Nov. 29.—Senate democrats have no disposition to obstruct action in the coming session of congress on any measure of general importance which can be fairly considered, Senator Robinson of Arkansas, minority leader declared today upon his arrival here.

He added that the democratic organization would co-operate in the passage of the appropriation bills.

Senator Robinson said it was incumbent on the republican majority to formulate the legislative program and that the democrats would not assume the initiative unless public necessity required. The minority leader added, however, that it was not to be expected that many measures of general importance would be acted upon finally at the short session opening Monday.

"The indications are," he said "that among the subjects which will receive attention are farm relief legislation, including co-operative marketing, the transportation act as it relates to the adjustment of labor disputes, rate making and freight schedules. It is doubtful whether any of these will be brought to a conclusion."

"It is anticipated that an effort will be made to dispose of the Muscle Shoals project and the policy of completing this project by the government seems to be gaining support."

"Further tax reductions can hardly be accomplished in the immediate future, owing to the condition of the revenues, but this subject undoubtedly will be revived in the early future."

"It is not practical to anticipate the emergencies which may change the outlook for legislation in the short session but the foregoing seems a fair outline at present."

FUGITIVE FIRES; SO DOES OFFICER

Policeman Carl Reber entered the Goodfellow Inn, Sixteenth and Locust streets, early Friday morning and a little later a man entered who, on seeing the officer, turned and fled. The policeman pursued, and the fugitive fired. The officer fired. Neither was injured, he reported to headquarters. The man escaped in the railroad yards to the east.

French Debt Hearing Soon

Washington, Nov. 29.—Informal exchanges looking to a refunding settlement of the French debt to the United States have progressed to the point where the matter will be laid before the American debt commission for discussion at a meeting called here for December 1.

Secretary Mellon called the meeting yesterday shortly after it had become known that the treasury head had held a series of informal conferences recently with Ambassador Jusserand on the subject of his government's war time obligation to the United States which ranks second in amount to the British debt, already refunded.

The result of these conversations to guide the commission in its discussion of the matter, is understood to be chiefly in the nature of a clarification.
