

RAISING REFORMS TO BE REPORTED

International News Service. Washington, Dec. 1.—Sweeping reforms in the banking system of the United States are essential that national banks may be maintained as the backbone of the nation's financial structure, the report of the Currency Commission, released today, declared.

Branch banking within the federal reserve system must be curbed and national banks replaced on a competitive equality with state banks or the system will collapse, Daves told congress.

To accomplish these results, Daves recommended amendment of the pending McFadden-Pepper banking bill, providing important amendments to the national banking statutes.

Unless congress provides legislation to meet what is considered a banking crisis, Daves said that the federal reserve system will take place within a few years, to such an extent as to reduce the system to the plane of an unimportant factor in the nation's financial structure.

Charge Inequalities. Citing results of alleged inequalities in intra-city banking between national and state banks, Daves declared that in Cleveland and Detroit only three national banks remained in operation, while in New Orleans the number has been cut to one.

Under present national banking laws, branch banking is prohibited in states where branch banking is permitted by law. State banks practicing branch banking would be barred from the federal reserve system except in states where laws or practices permit the operation of branches, according to Daves.

World Limit Privileges. "State banks should not be permitted to avail themselves of such advantages as were established prior to the date of passage of the proposed McFadden-Pepper bill," Daves continued.

"Should any state which does not now permit branch banking after passage of this bill, enact legislation which will permit the establishment of branches, national banks shall not have their facilities extended by such legislation."

"National banks, it is added, 'afford a strong, aggressive and permanent membership, having resources of over \$23,000,000,000 and ranging in size from the greatest bank in the world to the small neighborhood institutions.'"

"It is unthinkable that, either through direct act or neglect, the United States government should permit dissolution of such an institution whose control over the nation's money is so vital."

"In spite of the fact that more than 100 national banks suspended or failed during the past year than in any one year since the inauguration of the national banking system, national banks generally withstood the strain and continued to maintain an outstanding influence in the financial system of the nation."

"I see they've torn down the old Boyd theater," remarked Walter Tupper Jones, one of the Fritz Leiber Shakespearean company on his arrival in Omaha Monday.

From which remark one might think Jones is a "pioneer" or veteran. But he numbers his summers just 17, an extremely engaging youth and a former Omahian.

Twelve years ago his father, Rev. John W. Jones, was pastor of an Episcopal church here, while his mother, Mrs. Mary Tupper Jones, was a leading member of the O. D. Woodward Stock company, playing at the Boyd. Her stage name was Paula Verne.

"One day Woodward wanted a boy to play 'Little Willie' in East Lynne and the mother said 'Why not use Tupper?' He gave me the part and in a week I had it down perfectly," said Walter Jones.

Moved to Denver. "I've been on the stage ever since. We went to Denver, where my father had charge of the cathedral. He died soon after."

Throughout the years mother gave us an education, supported me and my three brothers and sisters and we are all on the stage now. I attended 28 schools in getting my first eight grades.

Mrs. Jones, Paul, Teddy and Isabelle are now playing with "The Swan" in Chicago. It ran all last year in New York. Steve, the other brother, is stage manager for Walter Hampton, now in Washington. And Walter plays with Fritz Leiber in Shakespeare.

Met Seamy Side. "Though we are all now with good companies, we have met the seamy side of an actor's life," said Walter.

"Once we were all in Detroit, out of work and with an engagement waiting us if we could get to Philadelphia."
