

BLUFFS CADETS Move Launched to Send 200 Youths to Inaugural Parade.

Two hundred Council Bluffs cadets will march in President Coolidge's inaugural parade at Washington, D. C., on March 4, if funds can be obtained to send them to the capital.

The Council Bluffs school board Tuesday night approved a plan to send a picked company of cadets and the drum and bugle corps to march in the parade.

Capt. H. H. Gallett, commander of the Reserve Officers Training corps of Council Bluffs High school, presented the proposal to send the cadets. His plan to raise \$5,000 among Council Bluffs business men to send the cadets to Washington was endorsed by the board.

The board Tuesday night instructed the building committee to obtain estimates on the cost of building a second story over the heating plant of Thomas Jefferson High school.

The school board engineer reported that a plan to construct a rifle range in the attic of Abraham Lincoln High school was impracticable, as the heating system could not be extended to this part of the building.

The board released the Dodge armory at Fifth avenue and Pearl street for three months, at \$200 per month. The building will be used for girls' physical training classes of Abraham Lincoln High school.

An arrangement was approved by which the board will pay \$75 for the use of the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium for training of the basketball team of Abraham Lincoln High school until March 1.

The board deferred action on the selection of a name for the new east end junior and grade school. The board divided evenly in voting on proposals to name the school "Gunn," "Woodrow Wilson," and "De Smet."

The superintendent of schools was authorized to arrange with the Omaha school board to give instructions in manual training and domestic science to students at Courtland school in East Omaha.

Fire Escapes Urged. A report submitted by Otto Wurl, director of physical education, recommending that outside fire escapes be installed at Harrison and Madison schools, was referred to the building committee.

The board fixed the dates for the Christmas vacation to begin on December 23 and end January 5.

The supplies committee was authorized to purchase Christmas trees for all schools. The building committee was authorized to purchase \$700 worth of hardware for the new East End school.

Henry Peterson reported to the board that arrangements had been completed for the formal opening of the new Bloomer school December 12. Night classes for foreigners will start at this school Monday.

The board authorized the purchase of 12 track suits and 14 football suits for the teams of Bloomer and Thomas Jefferson schools.

The board voted to allow Sergeants Moore and Wilson, assigned to the R. O. T. C. detachments, \$15 each per month for caring for the R. O. T. C. supplies. The allowance last year was \$20 per month.

Marjorie Anderson, a teacher, was granted an extension of her leave of absence until the end of the next semester in order to complete her courses at the University of Nebraska.

NOTE THREATENS RE. SHEATSLY

"You Kill My Wife, I Kill Yours," Says Anonymous Letter; May Offer Clue.

Columbus, Dec. 3.—"You kill my wife and I kill yours." An anonymous letter, scrawled in almost illegible handwriting on a piece of ordinary note paper and bearing this postscript, was turned over to detectives today by Rev. C. V. Sheatsley, whose wife's body was all but incinerated in the paragoner's funeral home two weeks ago.

The letter was signed with a skull and crossbones and was addressed to "Rev. Sheatsley, Columbus, Ohio." The postmark, which was very distinct, showed the letter was mailed at Buffalo, N. Y., at 9:30 p. m., November 24. It read:

"I kill your wife and I will kill you. No detectives will get me. I murder them all. The police think she kills herself—ho ho! 'Rev. Sheatsley, I will get you because 'You kill my wife and I'll kill yours.' At the top of the note were pencil identifications of a sentence that was erased. It said:
