

PREP'S 11 TO 0 DEFEAT OF TEAM THAT HAD NOT BEEN BEATEN FOR THREE YEARS STARTS RUMORS

Hundreds of Dollars Wagered on Contest That Was Played Turkey Day—Coach Drennan and the Young Bluejays Know Nothing of Alleged Drugging of Driver, All-State Tackle.

THE Hartington (Neb.) High school has started to unload its package of grief, collected during the Creighton Prep-Hartington football game. Last Thanksgiving day the Creighton High school gridsters from Omaha rolled out to Hartington and met the Hartington High eleven on the gridiron. Preps emerged from the game with the big end of a 11 to 0 score. It was the first time in three years that Hartington had been beaten.

"None of my players were approached by any of the alleged gamblers before or after the game. They knew nothing of the alleged drugging of Driver until a short time before we left for Omaha. In my opinion the best man to ask whether or not Driver had been drugged would be Captain Driver himself."

A COWARDLY ACT.

The greatest sport in the world is one that is played for either prizes or recognition only. Those whose support has always been obtained by means of the betting ring have invariably become decadent and finally vanished into oblivion. We have but to look at the famous or rather infamous "Black Sox Scandal" in order to appreciate that fact and the ever growing popularity of football which is the greatest of amateur games, to prove the contrary.

On Thanksgiving day the Hartington High school played a game of football with Creighton Prep from Omaha. The Creighton team and their coach, Mr. Drennan, are as fine fellows as ever appeared on a field in Hartington. Hartington High started the game under more or less of a handicap with the loss of Evans, the big tackle, but went into it with that "do or die" spirit that has made the high school teams feared throughout northeast Nebraska. Shortly after the game began it was easily seen that there was something wrong with Captain Driver as he seemed dazed and did not know what to do. He had not been injured in any way that might make him that way, so a quiet investigation was started and it has been rather definitely decided that he was drugged before the game in order that he might be so incapacitated as to render him practically useless during the game. The suspicion was aroused from stories of the number and amount of bets that had been laid upon the result of the important game. If any of the charges concerning the doping of this ordinarily wonderful player can be proven, it would establish itself as the most dastardly attempt to corrupt and destroy amateur athletics that has ever been attempted in Nebraska. In passing we are credibly informed that, if proven, it carries with it a penalty of from one to five years in the penitentiary. The Herald is in great

hopes that the affair will be sifted to the bottom and if such an ugly charge can be fastened upon the perpetrators, they will be sentenced to limit of the law and forever-scourged from the sight of decent people. There can be no suspicion attached to Coach Drennan of the Creighton team or any of his players, as they are far too fine sportsmen to become a party to or to even give their consent to anything of that kind, but, if it was done, it was done by some despicable individuals who are willing to corrupt the finest amateur sport in the country, or even take away the life or reason of a player, in order to win a dirty bet.

"STRANGLER" LEWIS DEFEATS VOLKOFF
Des Moines, Dec. 8.—Ed (Strangler) Lewis, world's champion heavyweight wrestler, defeated Hason Volkoff, Bulgarian heavyweight, in straight falls in their match here tonight. In a preliminary match, Michael Romano of Italy defeated Wallace Dugid of Canada in straight falls. The men are heavyweights.

Lewis won the first fall in 23:30, with a double wrist lock, which he obtained after weakening his opponent with a series of headlocks. The second fall was obtained in 2:35, with a combination headlock and armlock. Volkoff was no match for Lewis, who had him on the defensive throughout the match, with the exception of a few minutes at the beginning. Romano obtained his falls with headlocks in 22:49 and 19:45, respectively.

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Mickey Walker Has Easy Time Beating Malone

Champ Outslugs, Outboxes St. Paul Battler From Start—Wormie Smith Wins Technical Kayo.



I. LAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 9.—Mickey Walker, world welter-weight champion, defeated Jock Malone of St. Paul in a 10-round no-decision boxing contest here last night, winning nine out of 10 rounds, according to the majority of newspaper men at the ringside.

Walker won the first round by carrying the fight to Malone. He crowded the St. Paul fighter, driving him both to the body at close range and also shook Jock with short, solid punches to the chin. Malone boxed cautiously, refusing to trade punches.

Walker piled up a big lead in the sixth. He waded into Malone, scoring effectively without a dangerous return. The crowd yelled to Malone to fight.

The titleholder was Malone's

master in the seventh. Mickey was driving hard right and left to the body interspersing them with jolting punches to the head. In the eighth round Walker all but dropped Malone with a right to the chin. Walker set a furious pace in the eighth and ninth, hooking lefts to the body that slowed Malone up. Malone tried desperately but his punches lacked force. Walker won the 10th round although Malone fought back desperately. Tonight's contest was the third meeting of the pair and was fought before 8,000 spectators. Walker weighed 148 1/4 and Malone 153 3/4 pounds at 3.
