

Major Leagues Decide to Hold Joint Conference in Chicago Next Week

Landis-Johnson Controversy to Feature Meet

Commissioner Winner in First Round of Battle Held at New York.

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—The last scene in the 1924 drama centering about baseball's governing forces will be enacted at Chicago next Wednesday, when Commissioner Kenesaw Mountain Landis will preside over a joint major league meeting which is expected to produce a final "showdown" in his war with Ban Johnson, president of the American league.

The decision to shift the meeting to Chicago was reached this afternoon by major league club owners who compromised on the date for their adjourned session after National league men had sought to arrange the gathering for this Saturday, while a majority of American league magnates held out for a postponement until late in January. The meeting is slated for 11 a. m. at the Congress hotel.

National league men, it was understood, insisted upon an early date for the meeting with Landis, because of a desire to press the advantage conceded to have been gained by the commissioner's supporters in obtaining endorsement from both leagues at their annual meetings within the last few days. American leaguers, on the other hand, in an effort to strengthen the hand of Johnson, were said to desire further time to solidify their ranks. Both sides finally consented to next week's date after an agreement had been reached by telephone with Landis at Rochester, Minn., where the commissioner has been kept by the illness of his wife.

Credited with a signal victory over Johnson in the outcome of the three days of major league deliberations here, Commissioner Landis was considered to be solidly entrenched for the final act next week, but there were strong indications that club owners, particularly in American league ranks, would seek a compromise that would settle the feud between the two warring officials.

The first move in this direction will be made by the special committee appointed by the American league yesterday to confer with Landis in an attempt to bring about "full harmony." Col. Jacob Ruppert, president of the New York Yankees and spokesman for this committee, announced that its members intended to meet Landis early next Wednesday at Chicago in an effort to pave the way for peace at the joint general session.

Johnson, who attended the meeting today, as did President Heydler of the National league, refused to break the silence he has maintained since his arrival. His friends, however, said he has deceived the rebuke of his own club owners yesterday without outward show of bitterness. They predicted he would make no move to obstruct the attempts to restore tranquility to major league ranks.

Landis, on the other hand, was represented as desiring a complete vindication of his policies and administration. The commissioner has charged that Johnson violated the agreement drawn up when Landis took office three years ago, that criticism of him was to be made publicly by any league official or club owner.

Today's meeting was presided over by Leslie O'Connor, secretary to Landis. It considered no matters outside the adjournment date, embodied in a resolution of sympathy to the commissioner.

Abolish Four-Round Bouts After December 17

Sacramento, Cal., Dec. 11.—Four round boxing contests permitted under the present California law will be abolished after December 17 and until such time as Gov. Friend W. Richardson appoints a boxing commission authorized by the voters at the last election, under a law which permits 10 and 12-round contests. Without the commission the law is operative and four-round contests cannot be held without permission of the commission. The new law becomes effective on December 17.
