National league men, it was under stood, insisted upon an early date for the meeting with Landis, because of a desire to press the advantage conceded to have been gained by the commissioner's supporters in obtaining endorsement from both leagues at their annual meetings within th last few days. American leaguers on the other hand, in an effort strengthen the hand of Johnson, wer said to desire further time to solidif their ranks. Both sides finally con sented to next week's date after a agreement had been reached by telphone with Landis at Rocheste Minn., where the commissioner ha been kept by the illness of his wife

Credited with a signal victory ov-Johnson in the outcome of the thre days of major league deliberation here, Commissioner Landis was con sidered to be solidly entrenched f the final act next week, but the were strong indications that club particularly in American league ranks, would seek a compro mise that would settle the feud between the two warring officials.

They predicted he would make no move to struct the attempts to restore tran quility to major league ranks.

Landis, on the other hand, was rep resented as desiring a complete vindication of his policies and administra-The commissioner has charged that Johnson violated the agreemen drawn up when Landis took office three years ago, that no criticism of him was to be made publicly by any league official or club owner.

Today's meeting was presided over by Leslie O'Connor, secretary to Landis. It considered no matters outside the adjournment date, embodied in a resolution of sympathy to the com-






