Chicago, Dec. 26 .- Traces of tv old fever, to which the death of William Nelson McClintock was asribed, were found by pathologists who made their preliminary report to the authorities today, after ninute examination of the young mil onaire's body.

Although a cursory examination of oung McClintock's body revealed 'nothing suspicious," according to the report of Dr. William McNally physician, Chief Justic Harry Olson, who ordered the inves tigation, today declared that probe would be continued.

Mrs. Clark's mother-in-law, Mrs. Clyde Clark, died of injuries. Kenneth Clark, 22, husband of Mrs. Mary Clark, and Clyde Clark, Kenneth's father, were injured. Hartman, 20-months-old nephew of Mrs. Kenneth Clark, escaped uninjured.
