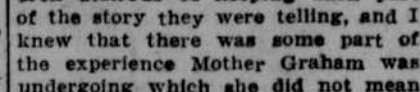
Nut Breads.

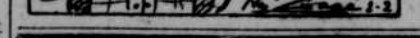
