

### Occidental May Play Creighton Here November 7

THE Occidental college of the southern California intercollegiate conference and Creighton university of Omaha may meet on the gridiron in this city next November 7, it became known yesterday.

Athletic Director Schabinger of Creighton, when told that a dispatch from Los Angeles carried the information that Occidental college was seriously considering an invitation from Creighton to play in Omaha next fall, said that he had been corresponding with the athletic officials at Occidental for some time and that prospects look bright for a big intercollegiate football game here November 7.

Occidental college is ranked third in the southern California intercollegiate conference. California university and Leland Stanford outranking the Occidental institution.

### New Cage Meet for High Teams

Omaha's High school athletic coaches at a meeting held Wednesday abolished the interclass basketball tournament which has been a fixture among the high school hoopers in years past and in its place has grown a basketball tournament which will be known as the annual interschool reserve tournament.

According to the plan of the coaches for the new tournament, each school will select as many teams as possible from basketball players who are not members of the school's first team. These teams will compete in a school tournament, the winner to represent the school in competition with the winners of the tournaments at the other high schools. The final winner will be known as the champion reserve tournament team of Omaha's high schools.

It is the plan of the coaches to decide the champion by the "round-robin" method of playing. The teams will be limited to eight players, and each player, in order to be eligible for the final series must have played in four of his school's intra-mural games.

The intra-mural tournament at the high schools will start next week. The city championship series will start February 15.

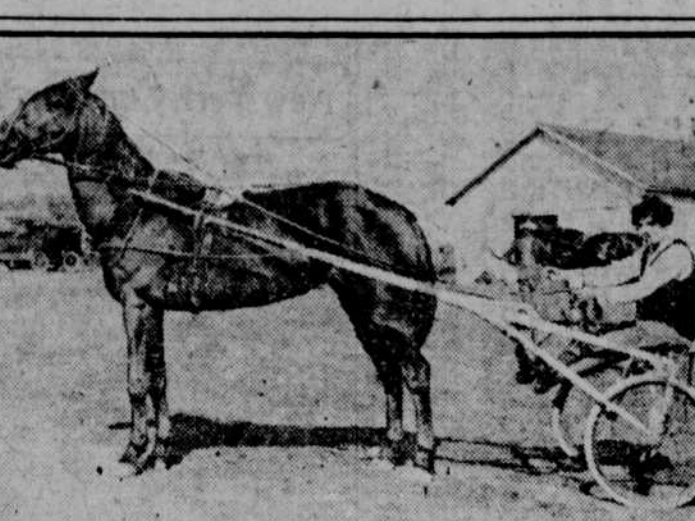

### Moving Gate Latest Innovation at Race Tracks Meets With Success

San Diego, Cal., Jan. 8.—Starter Marshall Cassidy's moving gate, latest innovation at race tracks, was tried in the first race at Tia Juana yesterday and had what horsemen called complete success. Starter Cassidy sent away 13 3-year-olds in perfect alignment. The experiment was watched with much interest by racegoers.

The gate or webbing, is attached to posts on two automobile trucks, moving slowly up to the starting post for a distance of about 100 feet. In the experiment the barrier was sprung when the horses were about 25 feet from the post. The trucks were inside the track with the horses. It is planned to grade approaches so that the trucks can run outside, giving room for large fields of horses inside.
