

City Bowling Tournament Starts Tonight at Recreational Alleys

Largest Entry List in History of Pin Tourney

Eighty Five-Men Teams Sign Up to Compete for Prizes—Doubles and Singles Start Saturday.

The annual city bowling tournament will get under way at the Omaha Recreation Parlor alleys tonight with 23 five-man teams bowling on 12 alleys.

Twenty-four teams will bowl Friday night, 24 Saturday night, and 10 Sunday night.

With a record entry list of 80 five-man teams, the 1925 tourney surpasses any city bowling tournament ever held in Omaha before, and comes close to equalling the record entry list of 98 local teams in the Mid-west meet held in Omaha in 1919.

Last year's city tourney was divided into two divisions, class A and class B, but the city bowling association has made the 1925 meet a handicap tourney.

Bowlers whose averages were less than 190, scratch, on January 1, 1925, will be handicapped on a percentage of 75 per cent of the difference between their established average and the scratch mark of 190.

This puts the pin tumbler on the same plane, and will give the weakest, as well as the most proficient bowler, a crack at the money.

The Nourse Oils won the 1924 five-man team event with a score of 3,024. It was the second consecutive victory for the Nourse men, as the Oilers copped this event in 1923.

The Omaha Towel Supply team was a close second in the Class A hoop with a 2,993 score.

Ole Olson shot high three-game score of 633, and Ken Seiple had a 632.

The Beau Brunmels captured the Class B first money with a 2,731 score. A Larsen had high single game of 222 in this event.

Rudy Zafna was crowned singles champ by bowling an almost unapproachable game of 715 in the Class A division, while Frank Swoboda rolled a 587 game for class B singles honors.

Ken and Ralph Seiple duplicated their feat of 1923 by acquiring the doubles title. They shot a 1,331 game.

Dave Woodbury topped the list in the all-events contest with a 1,919 score.
