POWELL, ent of The Omaha Lincoln, Jan. 19 .- Collection of the proposed 2-cent gasoline tax shall be imposed on the shipper and all gasoline used for domestic or agricultural purposes, excepting in autos, is exempt from the tax under terms of a bill thrown into the house hopper today by Lee of Hastings. The Lee plan of collection is similar to that followed in numerous states where 87,000 Out of 162,000 Work gasoline tax is collected.

Lee would force the producer or shipper to add the tax to the bill sent to the retailer. It would behoove the retailer to add the 2 cent tax to the consumer. The shipper must send the money direct to the state department of trade and commerce under provisions of the Lee bill.
