

Sioux City Wins 23 to 21 Game From Central High School Hoopsters

McBride Cages Winning Points in Last 50 Seconds

Knapple's Protoges Outplay Iowans in First Half; Wally Marrow, Horacek High Scorers for Purple.

WITH defeat staring his teammates in the face, McBride, rangy Sioux City forward, broke loose in the last 50 seconds of the game and sank two beautiful baskets, which enabled Coach Green's Iowa hoopsters to tuck away a 23 to 21 victory over Central high school's quintet.

The winner of the hotly contested affair, which was played at the Creighton gymnasium Friday afternoon, was not decided until the dying seconds of the game. With but a scant three minutes left, Knapple's crew was on the winning edge of a 21 to 19 score.

Fighting desperately to overcome the slight lead, the Iowans dribbled and passed their way down the floor but were unable to pass the Purple guards. Seeing that victory must be secured immediately, Coach Green "jerked" Twoogood and inserted Hatter.

This slight change, perhaps, won the game. But let it be remembered that Twoogood's bullet like passing was one of the main factors that kept the Sioux in the race. With Hatter in the game, the Iowans started going. Not long after the teams were fighting on even terms. The timer was ready to clock his watch, when amid wild cheers, McBride broke loose and shot two pretty baskets before the crowd realized that he had won the game within a twinkling of the eye.

During the entire first half the Omaha crew was slightly the better both considering floor work and last shot shooting. The Iowans' short passes were constantly getting them into serious tight places.

The Iowans drew first blood in the first few minutes of the first quarter. Spencer caged a couple of fouls. The Omahans came right back at their enemy. Marrow dribbled the length of the floor and arched an underhand basket. As fast as the ball could be tipped from the center, Marrow and Horacek worked the ball down into the shadows of the basket, where "Wally" again worked his underhand trick.

For the remainder of the quarter the Sioux men garnered two more points. The quarter ended with the score standing 4 and 4. In the second quarter the Omahans showed up excellent, both on the offense and the defense. Before the quarter ended the score stood 12 to 8 in favor of the Omahans.

The little "speech" which Coach Green gave his proteges during the intermission perhaps worked good. The Sioux boys came out and displayed a real brand of ball. Their short passes were beginning to hit their mark with efficiency.

Marrow missed an underhand shot to start the half. Brown then got away and caged a basket from the middle of the floor. Horacek and Twoogood then alternated in hitting the net and the score stood 14 to 12 in favor of Central. Before the half fought third period ended Omaha was still leading, 18 to 16.

McBride then got loose and tied the score. Marrow staged some clever footwork when he averted the Sioux guards and shot a basket. He later shot a foul, making the score 21 to 16 in favor of Central. Then McBride turned his trick with 50 seconds to play.

THE PAS DOG DERBY MAY BE POSTPONED

The Pas, Man., Jan. 23.—With withdrawal of several of the leading competitors from the annual 1,200-mile Pas dog derby on February 1, was threatened today unless promoters abandoned the proposed course along the Hudson Bay railway to Herb lake.

Experienced dog mushers, including "Shorty" Russick, last year's winner, adopted a resolution last night protesting that the course, including 162 miles along the railroad track, was "unpardonably cruel" to the dogs.

President Hal Crowe of the Pas Dog Derby association, said the course had been selected some months ago and that it would be impossible to alter plans at this late date.

FUENTE-FULTON CASE POSTPONED

Los Angeles, Jan. 23.—The Fuente-Winsor-Fulton-Reddy case, an echo of the boxing bout at Culver City, near here, last year when Fred Fulton of Minneapolis went down after 35 seconds in the ring with Tony Fuente, Mexican heavyweight, was postponed again today. It will be called next Friday.

Fuente and Fulton, together with their respective managers, Fred Winsor and Jack Reddy, are charged with conspiring to violate the then state boxing law against prize fights.

'Big' Munn Seeks Injunction Against Lewis

Kansas City, Jan. 23.—Wayne (Big) Munn, world heavyweight wrestling champion, applied in circuit court this afternoon for an injunction restraining Ed (Strangler) Lewis and his manager, Billy Sandow, from circulating reports that Munn is not entitled to the championship title. Munn declared that stories alleged to have been circulated by Lewis and Sandow were hurting his chances of getting matches. The former Nebraska university football star won his title in Kansas City on January 8. In the second fall, Lewis was thrown out of the ring. Lewis and his manager have claimed afterward the referee should have declared a foul and awarded the match to Lewis.

Dempsey-Gibbons Match Planned

Chicago, Jan. 23.—Frank Flounroy, matchmaker at Madison Square Garden, New York city, is expected here tomorrow morning presumably intent upon closing negotiations for a match between Jack Dempsey, the champion, and Tom Gibbons, in New York in May.

Eddie Kane, manager of Gibbons, who was notified of Flounroy's coming, said in reference to a Paris dispatch today that Manager Bettison of the London Sporting club was awaiting his answer on a proposed Gibbons-Firpo fight on January 25, that he had given his answer several days ago.

"I offered the proposition of a guarantee of \$75,000 to Gibbons and \$3,000 for expenses," Kane said. "That is the only answer I have and that already has been given."

SISLER SATISFIED WITH CONTRACT

St. Louis, Jan. 23.—George Sisler today indicated he was thoroughly satisfied with the contract he signed yesterday to act for another season as playing manager of the St. Louis Browns. While no official information was available as to the salary, it was commonly reported to be \$20,000, an increase of about \$2,000 over that of 1924.

HEINIE ENGEL WINS WRESTLING TITLE

Dubuque, Ia., Jan. 23.—The world's middleweight wrestling championship changed hands here last night when Heinie Engel, Dubuque, downed Lou Halaber, Chicago, with a toehold in one hour and forty-five minutes. The wrestlers got away to a slow start, but warmed up to their work and the big crowd voiced its approval when the local boy was returned the victor.
