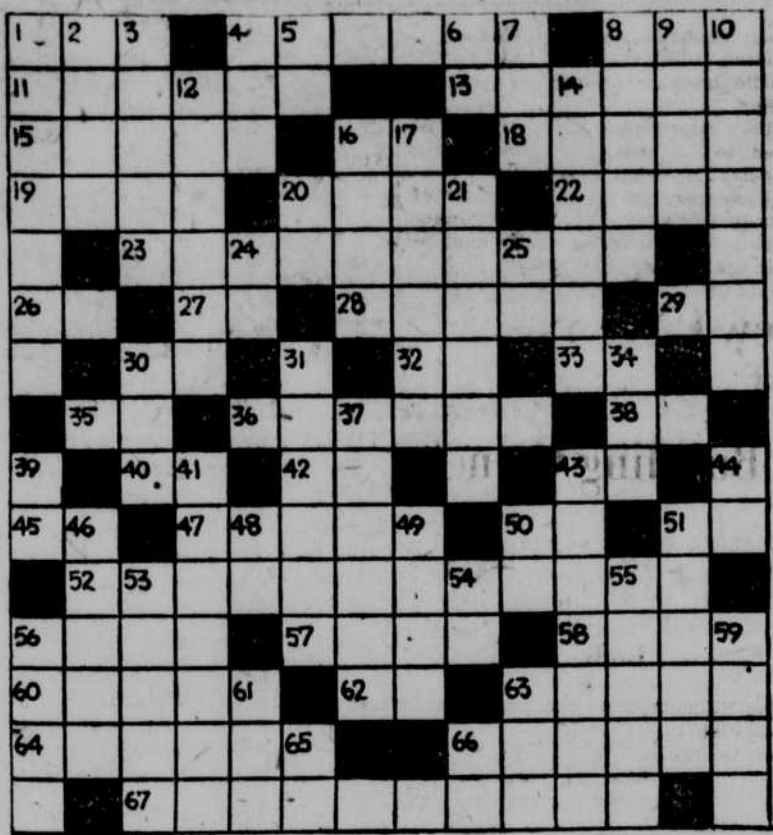

Visiting Nurses Aid Mothers Rear Healthy Babies



Upper left: These children when first examined at a nutrition clinic were found to be 14 per cent undernourished. Seven per cent is considered high, and above that point dangerous.

Right: The visiting nurse gives directions for the care of a newborn baby in the home. Education along those lines have reduced the fatalities arising from child birth more than 50 per cent during the past year.

A total of 62,239 visits were made by nurses from the Visiting Nurse association last year, which is an increase of 25 per cent over the preceding year, according to statistics given at the annual meeting.

Omaha people are fast becoming educated along the lines of hygiene and sanitation and for that reason the number of diseases which result from these causes will be materially reduced during the coming years, according to the report of Florence McCabe, superintendent of the association.

During the last year 5,397 patients who were given care by the field nurses were discharged as cured and the mortality was 154.

The average cost of each case was but \$6.46. The nurses, of whom 27 were employed, spent a total of 7,800 days in ministering to the sick and made an average of 2,529 calls each, which represented eight each day.

The report shows that deaths of mothers of the city between the ages of 15 and 47 showed a decided decrease during the last year, although the birth rate was increased by 541.

Last year 1,056 expectant mothers attended clinics.
