

Fred Fulton Pleads Guilty to Conspiracy Charge of Violating Coast Boxing Law

Twin City Boxer Ordered to Pay Fine of \$500

Court Grants Minnesota 'Plasterer' Time Until Monday to Raise Necessary Sum; Trials of Others Start.

Los Angeles, Jan. 30.—Fred Fulton, former aspirant to the crown as world's champion boxer, today entered a plea of guilty to a charge of conspiracy to violate the California boxing law when his case was called in superior court for trial.

The trials of Jack Reilly, Fulton's manager; Tony Fucito, self-styled "Mexican champion," and Fuentes' manager, Fred Winsor, were then started.

Fulton was immediately fined \$500 or 25 days in jail. He elected to pay the fine, but asked the court for time until Monday in which to raise the money. His request was granted.

All four of the defendants were present in court and a large crowd, mostly followers of the squared ring, were also on hand.

NEW TRIAL ASKED IN NARCOTIC CASE

Sam House, well known sportsman, who was freed by a jury on charges of violation of the narcotic law, and Pat Burkley, who was convicted and the verdict set aside by Judge Woodrough, may be retried if Judge Woodrough sustains the motion filed by Eugene O'Sullivan in behalf of Frank O'Neill for a new trial, according to United States Attorney Kinsler.

O'Sullivan has asked that the conviction of O'Neill be set aside as one of the jurors was not a citizen and could not legally serve on the jury. Attorneys are divided on the question whether a man acquitted can be tried again.

"If the conviction of one man by this jury cannot hold then the acquittal cannot either," said Kinsler. Judge Woodrough said he would make his decision on his return from California.

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Thirty-One Track Marks Shattered Since Opening of Indoor Season

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—Thirty-one world records have gone by the boards and seven have been established since the coming to America of the scurrying Scandinavian, Paavo Nurmi. Two have been tied.

Wille Ritola of the Finnish-American Athletic club, and his record for the indoor season almost equals that of Nurmi.

Ten marks have been eclipsed. Ritola, who runs up to five miles with ease, beaten in the 5,000-meter event when Nurmi first appeared in the United States and broke the record with a time of 14:44 3/5, last Saturday.

NO FILM CONTRACT FOR 'RED' GRANGE
