WILL GIVES CASH FOR SCHOLARSHIPS

Millionaire Daughter of Iowa Pioneer Leaves \$100,000 to Students.

Four trust funds of \$25,000 each, to be used to provide university scholarships for deserving young men and women of Cass and Pettawattamie counties, are established by the will of Alice B. Graham, a copy of which was filed in Council Bluffs district court Monday.

Miss Graham does not specify the number of students to benefit from the scholarship funds, but stipulates that the scholarship shall be awarded on a basis of scholastic record and through competitive examinations.

The money for the creation of the funds will be derived through the sale of 1,000 acres of farm land owned by Miss Graham in Pettawattamie county and 1,700 acres in Cass county.
