

Slogan Contest Winners Will Be Decided Tonight

Judges at Work and Announcements Will Be Made From Brandeis Theater Stage.

The winner of the \$100 slogan contest conducted by The Omaha Bee in conjunction with the Brandeis Theater will be known tonight. The judges now have the slogans in hand and are at work determining the four winners of cash prizes. Nearly 1,000 persons submitted slogans so the task confronting the judges is no small one, particularly so many really excellent slogans were received and it is difficult to choose between them.

The judges are: Rev. Thomas Cassidy, rector of All Saints church; Gen. George B. Duncan, in command of the Seventh Army Corps Area; L. Van Deusen, chief of police; Rabbi Erick Cohn of Temple Israel, and J. Stuphan, manager of the Brandeis theater.

Announcement of the winners of the contest will be made at 8 tonight on the stage of the Brandeis theater, where the motion picture, "Broken Laws," is now playing. Names of the winners also will be published in The Omaha Bee on Friday. In the event the winners are in attendance at the Brandeis tonight their prizes will be awarded to them at the theater, upon proper identification.

There will be two performances of "Broken Laws" at the Brandeis theater tonight, the first performance beginning at 7, the second performance at 9. Announcement of the slogan contest winners will be made in the intermission between the two shows.

WAR ON PEDDLERS BEGUN AT AURORA

Aurora, Feb. 4.—City officials of Aurora have declared war on peddlers, declared a nuisance by merchants and citizens. Police Judge W. S. Day assessed a fine of \$50 against Joseph L. Hedzes and Julius W. Ross of Onawa, Ia., who have been taking orders for and delivering Iowa hoke balls. In the past many peddlers have been able to avoid paying the license tax because their goods entered into interstate commerce. City council is considering an ordinance requiring all peddlers to put up a bond before going to work in the city and it is believed that this will end this nuisance.

Chadron Normal College Enrollment Increases

Chadron, Feb. 3.—Enrollment in the Chadron State Normal college continued to grow during the first week of the second semester and between 50 and 75 new students registered for college work. According to President Elliott of the Chadron Normal, the enrollment for 1925 is the largest ever in the history of the school. In part, the increase in the number of students at Chadron is due to the recent burning of the Spearfish Normal college at Spearfish, S. D. Although that school is not completely closed, the fire caused a lack of equipment for the advanced sciences in laboratory work.
