On the first day out, the president was transacting no business to require Grayson to tell the story to the president.

It was the story of the Irishman's conception of socialism - an old one now, but I repeat it for the comment Mr. Wilson made upon it, as indicating the kind of huraor he en joyed most:

"You tell Swem his memory is fail-ing," said Mr. Wilson. "I told him that story myself. It's my favorite." Story telling with him was not a plaything, a mere excuse for sociability or the means of passing an idle hour. It was in part an irregood fellowship; for the rest, it was a very serviceable compensating device in moments of crisis. In times of intense nervous strain, when ev-ery body around him was taking fire from the coal-hot events of the times, he found calm in a good story or a bit of humor,

On the morning after the Lus tania was sunk, when the country was at white heat and his desk wa literally covered with telegrams of fering advice, he stopped in the midst of his work to tell me an Irish story. It is an old story now, one that I would have forgotten but for the occasion of its telling. He was as deeply affected as any mar in America by the event of the day before, but it was in crises such as this that he displayed his extraordinary courage and self-mastery.


Wilson Defends Silence.

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
