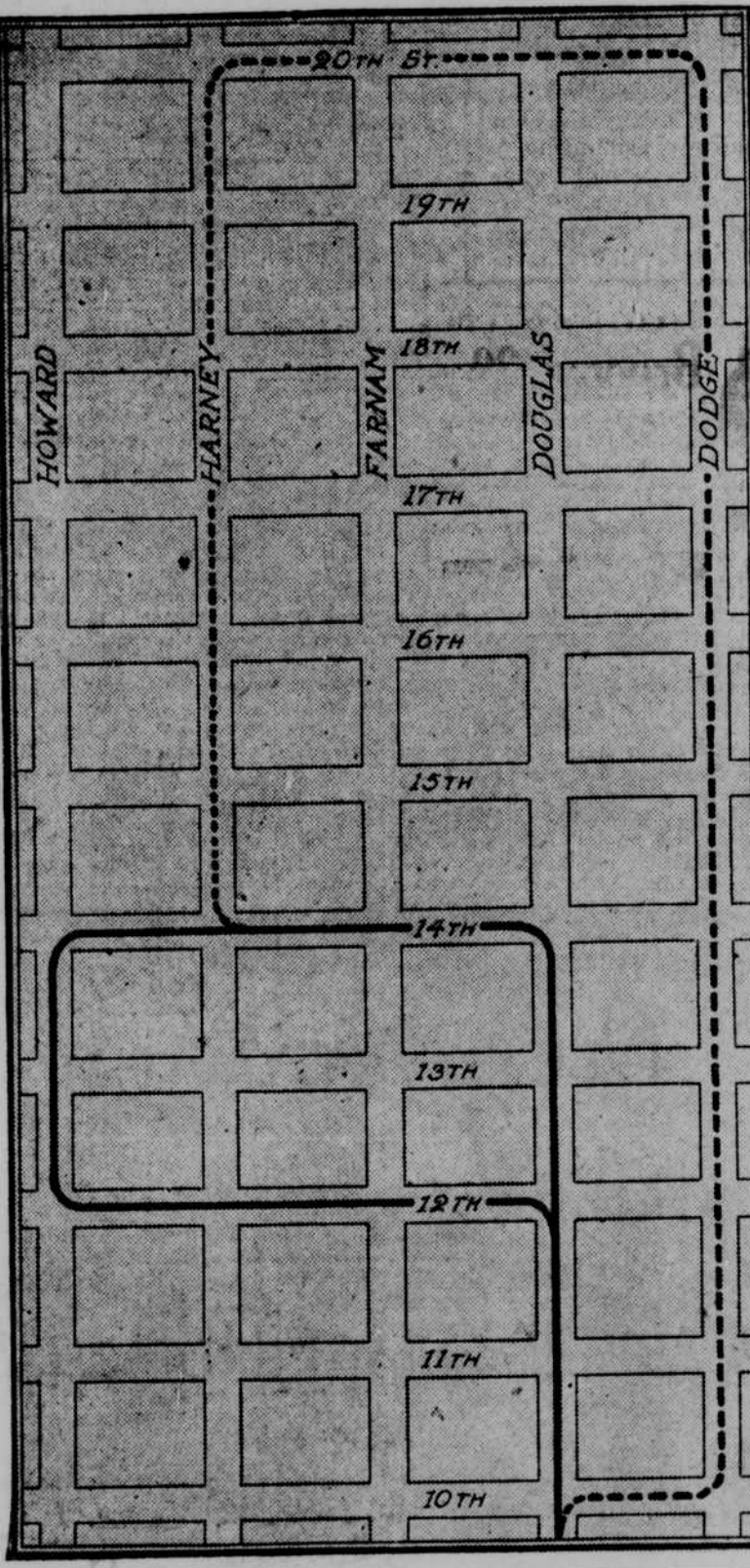
### New Loop for Bluffs Tram, Plan
