Postal Increase Bill to Coolidge

Measure Carrying Salary Boost Goes to White House for Approval.

Washington, Feb. 27 .- Congress sent the new omnibus postal bill to the White House today for President Coolidge's approval.

The measure, which will become a law as soon as the president signs it. will provide \$65,000,000 wage increases for postal employes and exact a similar amount of increased postal revenues from higher postal rates. This provision was added by congress to meet the objections raised by the president when he vetoed a pay increase bill last year. 




