To Continue Efforts.

None of the plans or suggestions of the committee met with the approval of Mr. Byrne, who stated that he had been caused to suffer severe financial losses in the past account of bankrupt sales where goods were thrown upon the market below cost of production and that he was going to proceed to dispose of the M. E. Smith Co., as rapidly as possible and close the institution.

The joint committee from the Chamber of Commerce and Greater Omaha Committee are going to put forth strenuous efforts to secure a large wholesale dry goods establishment already established, because it was the umanimous opinion that buyers would not come to Omaha and be confined to their selections from one wholesale in-

stitution. The promise to work for the es tablishment of a new wholesale dry goods house in Omaha is regarded by those who have been in touch with the situation as beng more than practical.


