The senate confirmed the re-nomination of Postmaster General Neal. Frank B. Kellogg was sworn in as secretary of state, and William M. Jardine as secretary of agriculture. Senator Swanson, Virginia, reintroduced in the special session of the senate his world court resolution. Senator George H. Moses, New Hampshire, was selected as republican candidate for president pro tempore of the senate. Representative Tilton, Connecticut, republican floor leader, was chosen chairman of the republican house committee on committees. The senate, after two sessions, decided whatever was done yesterday in violation of senate rules when Vice President Dawes took the chair, should be considered legal and proper. President Coolidge returned to the senate the nomination of Charles E. Warren to be attorney general, but omitted the nomination of Thomas E. Woodlock for the interstate commerce commission.
