

Husker Track Stars Depart for Valley Meet

Sixteen Men to Compete in Indoor Event Today; Locke Expected to Star in Dashes.

LINCOLN, March 20.—Coach Henry Schulte and 16 University of Nebraska track and field men left this evening for Kansas City to compete in the Missouri valley indoor meet tomorrow. The 16 athletes are Cohen, Lewis, Crites, Wirsig, Rhodes, Weir, Lock, Ross, Houderschildt, Sherrick, Davis, Kriemelmeyer, Reese, Daily, Zimmerman and Lawson. The coach said he was handicapped by the condition of some of his most dependable performers. Captain Crites, quarter-miler, may not be able to compete and Schulte said he was in doubt who he will enter in the mile relay. Three of his relay men, Hein, Berckord and Mandary, are unable to make the trip.

Locke will be the main dependence in the 50-yard dash and Daily, Weir and Rhodes are also listed in this event. Rhodes, Locke and Daily may also enter the low hurdles. Zimmerman, Lawson, Ross and Lewis are counted upon for the long distance runs. Wirsig and Davis are making the trip for the pole vault event. Rhodes probably will enter in the high jump and Kriemelmeyer will be in the shotput.

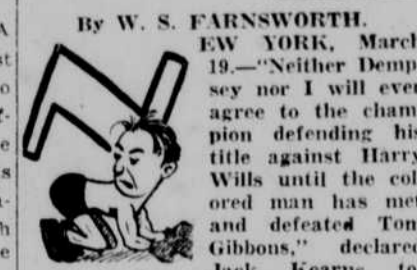
