How much I miss you at such a time as this just after our great naval victory.

The brilliant fighting of our army doing, with insufficient numbers and very insufficient artillery...

You have won for yourself a high place already as one of the popular heroes of the war...

I was in the War department on Sunday when Shafter's disheartening despatch came...

I hear talk all the time about your being run for governor and congressman...

I think it by no means impossible that I see in congress could be brought about...

Trenches outside Santiago, July 7, '98.

Dear Cabot: As I only write you and Edith you must pardon my persistent jeremiads.

First, the unimportant, which is personal: Wood has commanded his brigade and my regiment in the hardest battle of the war...

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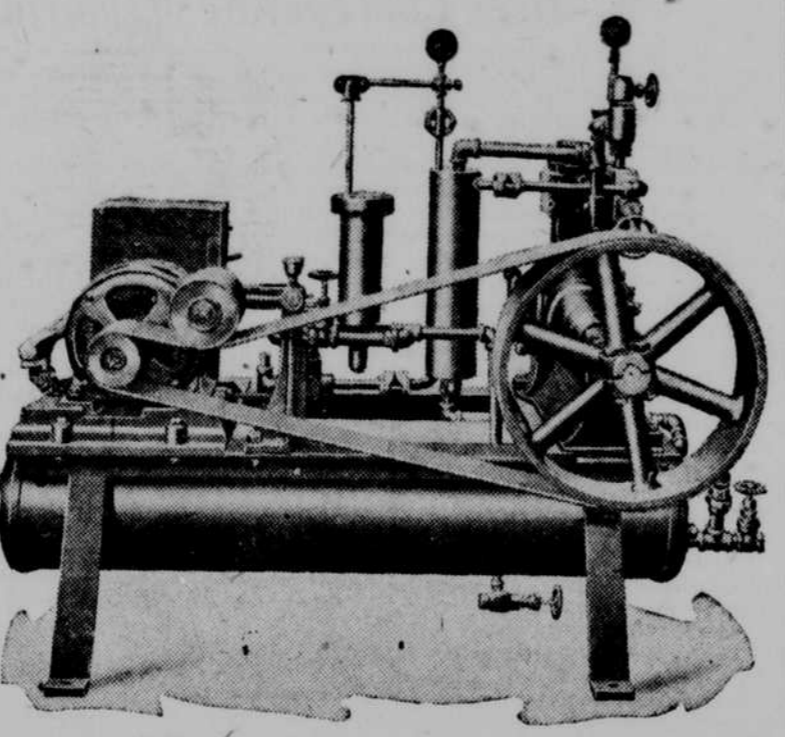
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New Baker Ice Machine Unit on Exhibition at Factory Here

The great difference between brisk and dull business conditions is the rate at which money changes hands. One dollar used twice develops the same amount of business as two dollars used once.

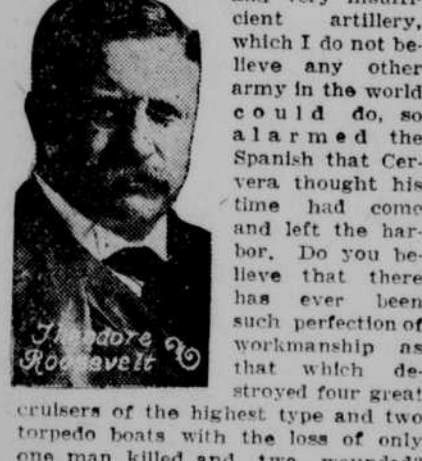

slow paying is caused by the feeling of uncertainty regarding the outlook, but its effect on business is to make a certainty of very much worse conditions than otherwise would occur!

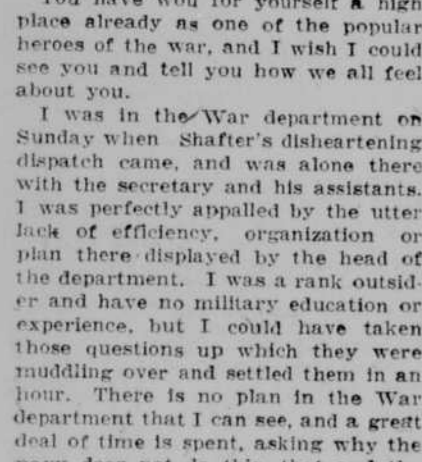
