

Rumored Hike in De-Discount Rate Unsettles Market

Prices Decline and Volume Curtained as Uncertainty Over Money Advance Increases.

By the Associated Press. New York, March 29.—Declining prices and curtailment in the volume of business marked trading in the bond market last week.

Uncertainty over the federal reserve discount policy unquestionably exerted a restraining influence on trading. The present 3 1/2 per cent was maintained at New York, but there were vague hints that the bank authorities were considering another advance of 1/2 per cent at an early date.

A prospect development which may affect the trend of bond prices is the return of Great Britain to the gold standard. Theoretically this move should increase the value of gold and at the same time the value of bonds, which represent promises to pay in gold at a future date.

The action of Switzerland raised the interesting question of whether other countries would not take advantage of similar situations to redeem outstanding bonds. Approximately \$100,000,000 of European bonds are callable this year, including large issues of Norway and Denmark, whose currencies have appreciated since their sale.

New bond offerings for the week totaled approximately \$33,000,000, an increase of \$10,000,000 over the volume of new financing in the preceding week.

German Stations Relay American Radio Program. Berlin, March 29.—Radio messages from America were freely received by the South German radio station at Stuttgart and relayed to German fans with perfect clarity, according to station officials.

Turkey Asks Transfer of All Foreign Embassies. Constantinople, March 29.—The Turkish government has addressed a note to the powers asserting that it cannot agree to the continuance of the foreign embassies in Constantinople. It demands the transfer of the embassies to Angora, in Asiatic Turkey, the present seat of the government.

Bok Donates \$50,000. New York, March 29.—A gift of \$50,000 by Edward Bok of Philadelphia, to the Walter Hines Page School of International Relations, at Johns Hopkins university, was announced today by Owen D. Young, president of the board of trustees of the school.

Industry Goes on as Stock Market Hits Lower Level

Present Attitude Filled With Uncertainty—Business Volume Below Expectations.

By T. C. Flynn. New York, March 29.—Spring has officially arrived, but the seasonal stimulation of trade anticipated by business men has not yet developed. There has been some improvement, but the hopes expressed shortly after election and again at the beginning of this year are far from being fulfilled.

The financial markets have reflected the disappointment. The stock market has been decidedly irregular and, on the average, stocks are at a new low level for 1925. Speculators have sensed that business is not quite up to expectations and have liquidated stock holdings. They feel that with spring falling to show much improvement in trade, the usual summer dullness will follow.

But, however the speculative mind may lean, the fact remains that industrial activity is continuing at a high rate, although it must be admitted this rate, taking industry as a unit, is below the highest levels reached early this year. Steel production holds up well above 90 per cent of capacity. The outlook for continuation of new orders at a high level is, however, uncertain.

In other lines, too, the tendency is for production either to approach closely to or exceed demand. That the volume of business is heavy is indicated by railroad traffic which continues at record breaking levels for this season of the year.

The present attitude is one of uncertainty as to prospects.

GIRL, 8, THROWN FROM CAR, HURT

Washington, Kan., March 29.—A lollypop may cost the life of Virginia Landon, 8, daughter of Ray Landon, Washington business man. Virginia and a girl companion accompanied the father in his coupe on a business trip into the country near here Friday afternoon after school.

Each of the little girls were riding a lollypop and when the candy was all gone, Virginia attempted to open the door of the coupe to throw out the sticks. In the strong wind, the door was jerked open suddenly while she held onto the handle and it threw her from the car seat to the roadside. She alighted on the hard ground on her forehead and shoulder.

The girl was unconscious for several hours after the accident, and still lapses into unconsciousness at intervals, due to concussion of the brain. Ugly wounds were made on the face and shoulder.

CHURCH LEADER NAMES CHAIRMAN

New York, March 29.—Rev. Dr. S. Parkes Cadman, new president of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, announced today the appointment of chairman of the organization's commissions and committee for the next four years.

The council is composed of 28 Protestant bodies and claims an adult membership of 20,000,000. The new appointments make a woman, for the first time, an officer of the administrative committee. Mrs. John Ferguson, New York city, was named vice chairman of that board. Rev. John A. Marquis, general secretary of the Presbyterian board of home missions, was elected chairman.

Dean Shaller Mathews, former president of the council, will continue as chairman of the western committee at Chicago.

Infection Is Fatal to Beatrice Mill Employee

Beatrice, Neb., March 29.—Henry S. Tyler, 60, died at his home here today from an infection following an attack of the flu. He was employed in the offices of the Dempster Mill Manufacturing company as assistant to H. L. Dempster, sales manager. His wife and one daughter survive. The body will be taken to Mitchellville, Ia., for burial.

King Ferdinand of Rumania May Die

Bucharest, Rumania, March 29.—The health of King Ferdinand is giving great concern to his physicians as complications have arisen from the recent operation performed on him for an intestinal trouble. The physicians have resumed the issuance of daily bulletins on the king's condition.

COOLIDGE YACHT OUT IN SNOWSTORM

By Universal Service. Washington, March 29.—Steaming up the Potomac in the swirling flakes of a belated snowstorm, the presidential yacht Mayflower was returning to Washington today.

The yacht weighed anchor at 7:45 this morning, in Chesapeake Bay, where it had spent the night riding out the gale. At 9 it had entered the Potomac and was received that it was "standing up the river."

President and Mrs. Coolidge, with their son, John Coolidge, Mrs. Coolidge's mother, Mrs. A. J. Goodhue, and a small party of friends, left Washington on the yacht, Friday night. Storms were encountered both nights the party has been afloat, and all the hours of darkness have been passed with the vessel at anchor, riding out high winds.

With the presidential party are Senator and Mrs. Gillett, of Massachusetts; Mrs. A. T. Kent of Kentucky; Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Glover, Jr., and Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Dodd of Washington.

Yesterday's plan was for the yacht to dock off Norfolk, Va., this morning, but the inclement weather forced a change.

BODY OF SOLON IS TAKEN BACK HOME

Washington, March 29.—The body of Representative John Jacob Rogers, who died here last night, was taken tonight to Lowell, Mass., where the funeral will be held Tuesday. Rev. Appleton Grannie, pastor of St. Anne church, will officiate. Because of Mr. Rogers' prominent position on the house committee on foreign affairs representatives of the state department and the diplomatic corps will attend the funeral, together with members of the house and senate.
