Hartington Athletes to Compete in Harrier Event

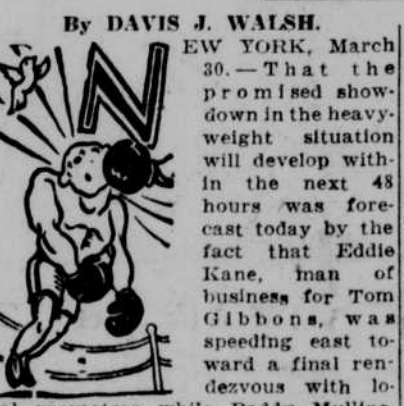

American Indians Contribute to Haskell Stadium

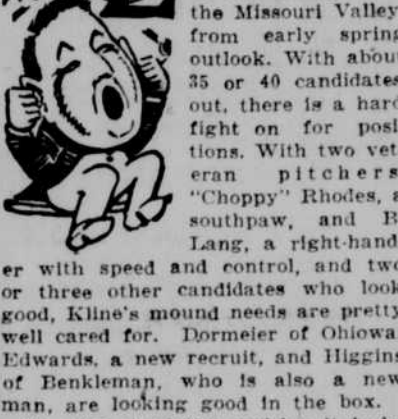

SMITH FAILS IN A. B. C. PIN MEET

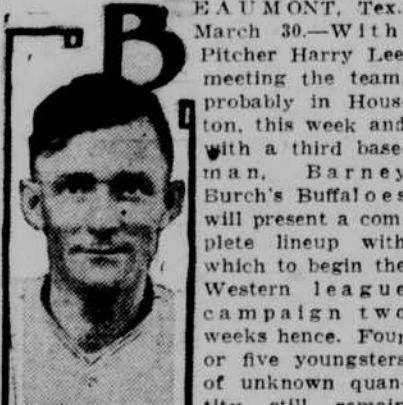

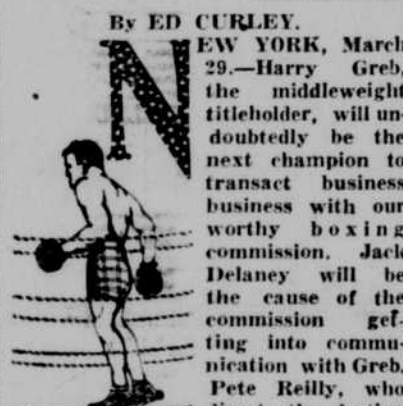
