

Lawyers' Tilt Cuts Shepherd Hearing Short

Resumed Session on Motion for Bail Continued to Thursday; Defense Charges Conspiracy.

By International News Service. Chicago, March 31.—The resumed hearing on the motion of William D. Shepherd to be admitted to bail pending his trial for murder for the death of William Nelson McWhorter, his foster son, was continued until Thursday.

The postponement was taken after a stormy session in which the defense, during a battle for permission to introduce new evidence, openly hurled a charge of conspiracy at the state.

The court, however, ruled that no new evidence could be heard until after other affidavits had been filed. Attorneys in Tilt.

Omaha Congressman, Home for Recess, Predicts Irrigation Law Soon.

Reclamation of the arid or semi-arid land between the Missouri river and the Rocky mountains will be the greatest problem before the next congress, in the opinion of Congressman Willis G. Sears.

"This project would make Omaha a city of 500,000 population," he declared. "The strip of wheat belt land between the Rocky mountains and the Missouri river, a tract approximately 2,000 miles long and 500 miles wide, would be made fertile by irrigation."
