Eugenia Not Married. "Mrs. Bellini, now with her siste in Chicago, is not dismayed at the question of her marriage's legality. It is unquestioned, except under the present regime in Italy. The present administration merely decreed that all divorces granted in Fiume-where Captain Bellini's was granted-were invalid so far as Italian law was con-

"Captain Bellini was imprisoned purely because he opposed the Musso-lini regime. The Cavalieri complaint made a month after this arrest.
