Von Hindenburg Is Dark Horse. German Nationalists Expected to Unite on War Lord, Eliminating Herr Jarres.

Berlin, April 4.—The consolidation of the nationalist ranks in the German republic behind Gen. von Hindenburg, generalissimo in the great war, was indicated as a strong possibility tonight as a result of the deadlock in the elections of a week ago.

Such a program would eliminate Herr Jarres, who polled the largest number of votes in the last election. The leading presidential candidates then were Jarres and former Chancellor Marx, a socialist.

Washington Sure Weeks Will Quit. Charles D. Hilles Believed to Be Probable Successor in Cabinet Post. Washington, April 4.—Another change in President Coolidge's cabinet is impending.

Definite assurances reached the White House today that John W. Weeks intends shortly to submit his resignation as secretary of war because of poor health, which culminated this week in a slight cerebral stroke.

His probable successor is Charles D. Hilles, of New York, long a republican wheelhorse and now New York's member on the national committee.

Hilles was closeted with the president for more than an hour today. He declined to say whether or not he had been offered the war portfolio, but the impression prevailed tonight that an understanding was reached.

Another suggestion advanced was that Postmaster General Harry S. New might be shifted to the War department, and Hilles made postmaster general.

A statement issued by Weeks' physicians today said he showed continued improvement, unless complications develop. It was said, the secretary would be able to return to his desk in about 10 days.
