Three Spinners



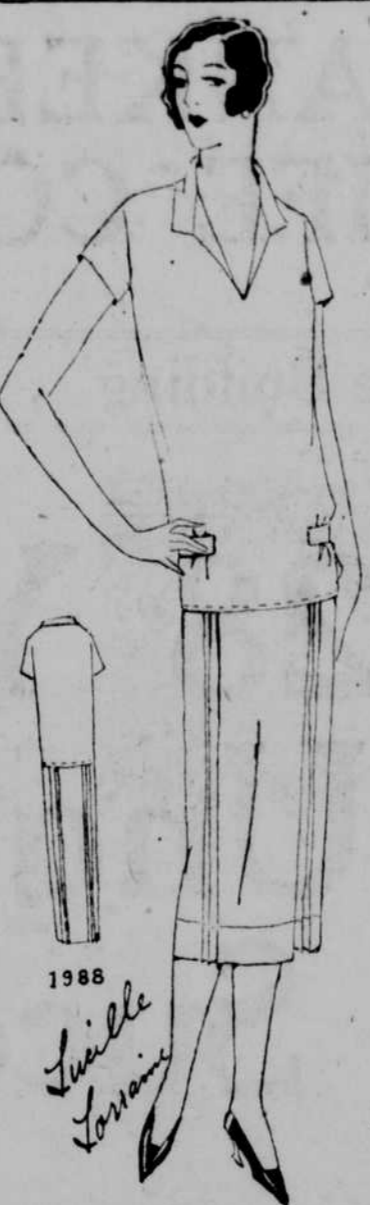
The Magic Spinners.
