The new and elegant Steamer Min-ne-ha-ha, Capt. Charles Baker, Master, will run as a regular packet, to the above and all intermediate points on the Missouri river.

The steamers from St. Louis have, for the past week, averaged one per day, and have discharged more freight at this point than last season.

The boats which passed up were the Omaha, John Warner, New Monongahela, Spread Eagle, E. A. Ogden, Silver Heels and Ennis.

The John Warner and New Monongahela discharged the largest amount of freight at this place. By the way, the officers of these boats are kind and obliging to those with whom they have intercourse.

The new and splendid Steamer SILVER HEELS, is certainly the swiftest boat on the Missouri river.

She left St. Joseph on last Monday morning, at half past two o'clock—discharged freight and passengers at all the different points, and lost three and a half hours at Iowa bar—time out from St. Joseph to Bellevue, one day and thirteen hours.

She left St. Louis on Tuesday evening 15th inst., at 7 o'clock P. M.—Lost one day below St. Joseph—lay ten hours at St. Joseph, and out from St. Louis to this city, but six and three fourths days. This is the swiftest running up the Missouri river on record.

We are obliged to the gentlemanly Captain and Clerk, for St. Louis papers up to the 14th inst. After discharging freight and passengers at this place, she proceeded to Omaha—and yesterday morning she passed back on her downward trip.

Private letters from Madrid, of the 10th, state that Lord Howden and the Marquis de Forgot are doing everything in their power to prevent the breaking out of hostilities between Spain and Mexico.

Pacific City is situated in Mills county, Iowa, on a beautiful plateau of ground in the Great valley of the Missouri, three miles east of the mouth of Platte or Nebraska river, four miles east of Plattsmouth on the Nebraska terminus of the B. & M. R. R., thirty miles north of Council Bluffs, Iowa, and Omaha City in Nebraska. It is adjoining the bluffs of the Missouri river, at the entrance of Poney creek into the bottom. It extends into the bottom two miles and within two miles of the channel of the Missouri river, the bottom gradually descending to the river.
