On the whole, it was an occasion which will long be remembered with pleasure. After a few patriotic toasts had been drunk, they all separated in quietness and good order, and returned in peace to their respective homes.

Territorial Convention at Nebraska City.

At a meeting held by the citizens of Otoe county, David Lindly was called to the chair and J. H. Maxon, chosen Secretary.—The following Preamble and Resolutions were then unanimously adopted:—

Whereas it is proposed to hold a Territorial convention at Bellevue, on the 15th inst., composed of delegates from the different sections of the territory, favorable to the removal of the Capitol, and opposed to the corrupt factions which have heretofore ruled this territory; to nominate a candidate for Congress—and whereas it is desirable that Otoe county be represented in said convention. Therefore, be it resolved,

1st. That the basis of representation be the same as in both branches of the territorial legislation.

2d. That the meeting appoint eight delegates, who, together with the chairman, shall represent Otoe county in said convention.

3d. That said delegates be un instructed as to the nominee, except he be capable, honest and true to the interests of those he would represent.

4th. That we pledge ourselves to use all honorable means to secure the success of our nominee.

5th. That should any of the delegates appointed at the present meeting, fail to attend, they are authorized to appoint substitutes, and should said county be fully represented in said convention, that those delegates, or a majority, to cast the whole vote, to which said county is entitled.

The following gentlemen were chosen Delegates: J. H. Decker, J. C. Campbell, Wm. McLennan, J. B. Bouliware, Henry C. Cowles, Henry Bradford, W. W. Horst, and M. Bi-hop. DAVID LINDLY, Pres. J. H. MAXON, Sec'y.
