Latest News.

FROM UTAH.

We have intelligence of the progress of the Utah expedition, through advices received at the War Department, up to the 7th of November. The troops of the expedition had concentrated at Ft. Bridger, in comfortable condition, and without any of the adverses reported in recent accounts, except the destruction of trains and the loss of 700 cattle. The preparation of the Mormons to oppose the further advance of the troops, and their determination to offer an armed resistance to their occupation of the Territory, is decided and desperate. The organization of their militia has been effected, and the command of the whole Mormon force entrusted to D. H. Wells, as Lieutenant-General. Any moment may bring continuation of a sanguinary battle.

WALKER ARRESTED IN NICARAGUA.

Gen. Walker and his filibustering banditti, who have for seven years past filled such a large space in the public gaze, seen at length to dribble into mere smoke. Commodore Paulding, of the U. S. Navy, acting under the proclamation and instructions of the President, lately made a descent upon the grey-eyed, destiny man, and his handful of anisericable vagabonds, after they had effected a landing in Nicaragua, and took them in charge to answer for offences committed against this government. Walker has been turned over to the authorities at Washington.

The Wyoming Telescope, after a suspension of several weeks, has been re-suscitated. Its editor, in reply to the query "Where is the Telescope?" says:

"This has been the inquiry for some weeks past. The Nebraska City News answers that it has suspended, but takes care not to tell the cause of the suspension, as that would not suit their purpose. The cause of the suspension was that some of our opponents or their emissaries, came in the dead hours of night, while ourself and our staff were asleep, and broke or rather cut through our building, not through the door, but through the wall, up our stairs, into the floor, and all our type broke our furniture, destroyed our paper, damaged our material and played smash generally.
