TO THE LAND OFFICERS IN THE TERRITORIES OF MINNESOTA, KANSAS AND NEBRASKA. BY joint resolution of Congress, approved March, 1857, valid pre-emption claims on the 16th and 36th sections, heretofore reserved for schools, in the Territories of Minnesota, Kansas and Nebraska, will be recognized WHERE THE SETTLEMENT HAS BEEN, OR MAY BE MADE PRIOR TO THE NURVEY.
