

The train from Union yesterday afternoon consisting of seven freight cars, a baggage and passenger car met with a serious accident. Just before reaching the bridge over Greenwell creek, the axle of one of the freight cars broke—the train entered the bridge, and the locomotive and one freight car had reached the other end of the bridge when the bridge broke in the center, and six of the freight cars and one baggage car went down, some of them near fifty feet. The bridge is about one hundred feet long. The brakeman on the passenger car (the last one in the train) seeing the danger pulled out the coupling pin and put on the brakes and checked up the car before it reached the bridge, so that it remained upon the track unharmed. There were about thirty passengers, including three ladies in the car. The name of the brakeman who showed so much presence of mind in the emergency, is Thomas Maloney,—he deserves an honorable mention.

The conductor of the train, P. Olin, Jr., and three passengers were in the baggage car—they were all slightly bruised, and that was all. The stove fell upon the conductor, but he managed to get it off without being burned.—Dayton (O) Journal March 5.

News from Mexico.—As was expected, the government of Zuloaga is like that of Comonfort, on the point of breaking to pieces and Mexico is once more drifting. According to the latest news Alvarez was again in arms against the government, and every petty chief who could raise a few men was exercising a sort of feudal despotism over as much territory as he could sweep. Indeed, the whole country reminds one of those wild countries of the middle ages, where no man's life and woman's honor were safe out of bowshot from a big castle, and where the occupation of the inhabitants was to make war upon one another, from year's end to year's end.

All this presages the return of Santa Anna, but after all, even this would postpone the end for a short time. Chronic disease must remain the condition of Mexico until it passes into the hands of the United States.
