TO TH LAND OFFICERS IN THE TERRITORIES OF MINNESOTA, KANSAS AND NEBBASKA.


BY joint resolution of Congress, approved March, 1857, valid pre-emption claims on the 16th and 36th sections, heretofore reserved for schools, in the Territories of Minnesota, Kansas and Nebraska, will be recognized WHERE THE SETTLEMENT HAS BEEN, OR MAY BE MADE PRIOR TO THE SUBVEY.

1st. In cases where the approved plat of survey has not yet been returned, the declara-tory statement must be filed WITHIN THREE MONTHS AFTER THE RECEIPT OF SUCH AP PROYED PLAT AT THE DISTRICT OFFICE.

2d. Where the plat is now in the Register's Office, the declaration must be filed within three months from the FIRST PUBLICATION OF THIS CIRCULAR IN YOUR DISTRICT.
