CIRCULAR. TO THE LAND OFFICERS IN THE TERRITORIES OF MINNESOTA, KANSAS AND NEBRASKA.

BY joint resolution of Congress, approved March, 1857, valid pre-emption claims on the 16th and 30th sections, hereafter reserved for schools, in the Territories of Minnesota, Kansas and Nebraska, will be recognized WHERE THE SETTLEMENT HAS BEEN, OR MAY BE MADE PRIOR TO THE SURVEY.

1st. In cases where the approved plat of survey has not yet been returned, the declaratory statement must be filed WITHIN THREE MONTHS AFTER THE RECEIPT OF SUCH APPROVED PLAT AT THE DISTRICT OFFICE.

A failure to comply with this requirement, will work a forfeiture of the claim.
