Ist. In cases where the approved plat of survey has not yet been returned, the declaratory statement must be filed wITHIN THREE MONTHS AFVER THE RECEIPT OF SUCH AP-PROVED PLAT AT THE DISTRICT OFFICE.

2d. Where the plat is now in the Register's Office, the declaration must be filed within three months from the FIRST PUBLICATION OF THIS CIRCULAR IN YOUR DISTRICT.
