TO FIGHT INJUNCTIONS.

Chicago Labor Leaders Organize for Active Campaign Work.

Labor leaders and members of labor organizations have formed the Injunction Reform League. The object of the organization is to inaugurate a campaign of education on the injunction question and to oppose the use of the injunction in labor disputes. The league also will take charge of the meeting to be held at a suburban park on Lahor Day, when W. J. Bryan will deliver his speech on the anti-injunction plank of the democratic platform.

"We shall endeavor to enlist as members of the league all persons, whether members of labor unions or not, who are opposed to injunctions 'n labor disputes," said Secretary Harding of the league.
