There are fair employers as well as unfair ones, but the latter greatly predominate, and the old story about the leaven in the bread still holds good. This brings us to the really pertinent significance of the day

If we should celebrate, we should also be united in the celebration. Why should this or that organization stand aloof in this matter! Is it not the concern of all, for the moment any union, however independent it may have been, finds itself in trouble, the first and instinctive act is to appeal to the brother unionists they have heretofore disregarded

This is the lesson of Labor Day. Do not get together only when your selfish interest is involved, but stay together at all times and do your share in helping the ones to whom you yourself will appeal if you get into trouble. If we can learn this lesson, Labor Day will have attained its end and will justify its existence.—Baltimore Leader.
