SOME FACTS ABOUT THE STATE THAT NEBRASKANS SHOULD SCATTER BROADCAST OVER THE WORLD

Very few people have any idea of the productivity of Nebraska. They have some comprehension of the gold output of the nation and of the several states. They think of the copper output as something wonderful. They think of the tobacco crop as one of the nation's great resources. Yet they utterly fail to realize that Nebraska produces in grains and grasses more wealth than the gold mines, the copper mines or the tobacco plantations. Wonderful stories have been told of the Alaskan mines, and thousands have been lured to the mountains of the west and the frozen wastes of Alaska by the glitter of the yellow metal. But in 1909 the corn crop of Nebraska was worth \$5,000,000 more than all the gold mined during the same year in the entire United States, including Alaska and the Philippines.

We have heard about sugar and its protection until we are apt to imagine that the sugar crop of the United States is something magnificent in its proportions. But the 1909 wheat crop in Nebraska was worth \$5,700,000 more than the entire sugar production of the United States during the same year. Texas is a great state, and it takes the lead in cotton production. We have heard a great deal about "King Cotton," but the 1909 oats crop in Nebraska

was worth \$4,500,000 more than the 1909 cotton crop of Texas.

Kentucky is the greatest tobacco producing state in the Union, and we are apt to believe it means more to Kentucky than any grain crop means to Nebraska. But the 1909 egg crop in Nebraska was worth \$500,000 more than the 1909 crop of Kentucky tobacco.

Rockefeller acquired his wealth from petroleum, and we are apt to imagine that the crude petroleum product is something far surpassing the entire product of Nebraska's fields and stockyards. Not so! In 1909 the Nebraska live stock product was worth \$9,000,000 more than the total crude petroleum product of the United States for the same year.

Illinois is one of the great coal producing states of the Union, and coal is one of the boasted products of the Sucker state. But Nebraska wild and tame hay in 1909 was worth \$14,000,000 more than the 1909 output of Illinois coal.

Nebraska butter in 1909 was worth \$3,000,000 more than the total gold and silver output of Colorado's mines for the same year.

Nebraska's 1909 corn crop was worth \$23,000,000 more than the Nation's tobacco crop for the same year.

Nebraska live stock, cereals, grasses, butter, eggs, fruit and poultry in 1909

was worth as much as the Nation's output of bituminous coal, save the output of Illinois, mentioned above.

The 1909 potatoes of Nebraska were worth \$1,800,000 more than the 1909 output of Arizona's gold and silver mines.

Nevada is a great mining state, but her 1909 output of gold and silver was worth \$1,000,000 less than Nebraska's 1909 crop of alfalfa.

Nebraska's total addition to the material wealth of the nation, in the shape of live stock, dairy products, poultry, eggs and manufactured goods was worth \$98,000,000 more than the total cotton crop of the Nation.

We hear much of the iron and steel industry, but Nebraska beef and pork in 1909 was worth \$45,000,000 more than the product of iron ore of the nation, valued at the mines.

Nebraska's 1909 wild hay crop was worth \$9,000,000 more than the 1909 output of Alaska's gold mines.

Isn't it a wonderful state? And isn't it our duty to spread a knowledge of it abroad to the land hungry and industrious peoples of the earth?

"Massachusetts, there she stands!" exclaimed Daniel Webster in his famous Dartmouth college speech. Correct—there she stands. And there she will have to stand until she pays back to the school children of Nebraska the \$1,000,000 she borrowed from them.

Great are the steel rail mills of Pennsylvania—but the eggs laid by Nebraska hens in 1909 would, if laid end to end in a double row, reach three times as far as all the steel rails rolled in Pennsylvania mills during the same year.

Loaded into standard freight cars the agricultural, live stock and dairy products of Nebraska would make a train twice as long as all the new railroads built in the United States in 1909—and

there were approximately 5,000 miles of new railroad built in that year.

One of the youngest, Nebraska is also one of the greatest states in the Union. Let us all work together for the upbuilding of Nebraska, and one way to accomplish the best results is to spread abroad the real facts about this beloved state of ours.

A LIGHT ATMOSPHERE.

Why Smoke "Beats Down" When It Leaves a Chimney.

"It's getting ready for a storm. See how the smoke beats down just as soon as it comes out of the chimney? That's because the air is so heavy it pushes the smoke down before it has time to rise."

One often hears this stated as fact concerning that most generally talked of subject on earth, the weather. The speaker was probably right under those conditions in prophesying a storm, but he was scarcely right in assigning as a reason that "the air is so heavy it pushes the smoke down."

Nearly everybody knows it is easier to swim in salt water than in fresh water. As salt water is heavier than fresh water it is evident that the heavier the liquid the greater the buoyant force.

The atmosphere exerts a buoyant force upon the smoke from chimneys in exactly the same way that water exerts a buoyant force upon a swimmer. Therefore when the smoke "beats down" as soon as it leaves a chimney it must be concluded that the buoyant force exerted upon it is relatively small and that the air is not heavy, but light.

A light atmosphere, or, rather, a sudden lessening of the pressure of the atmosphere generally, takes place before a storm. Therefore the smoke from chimneys, if observed intelligently, furnishes a pretty good weather indicator.—Chicago Record-Herald.

VEGETABLE FOODS.

Spinach Rich in Sulphur and Iron, Pumpkin in Phosphorus.

The French have a saying that "parsley is a broom to sweep the stomach." Lettuce is a nerve food. Radishes build tissue and are rich in phosphorus and in iron.

Horseradish contains a higher percentage of sulphur than all the other vegetable roots, spinach ranking next in value. Spinach also contains a large proportion of iron.

A mayonnaise dressing with lettuce is especially desirable for thin people, but for the overplump French dressing is to be recommended. The action of vinegar on the digestive organs, however, is not to be considered. The acid of lemon juice is preferable.

While apples are a most excellent fruit for brain building, which phosphorus aids in, the humble pumpkin, desecrated to the uses of pie and jack o' lanterns, holds the prize. Pumpkin rates 2.79 in phosphorus, while apple is but .45.

When in search for this special element take up a pumpkin diet. But as winter squash would stand the same analysis it can be used as a vegetable in many varieties and thus the needed phosphorus supplied. Cucumbers rank next in phosphorus value to pumpkin, being 2.08.—Vegetarian Magazine.

The Tricky Fox.

A gentleman while hunting near a river one winter day saw a fox run out on the ice and make at full speed for an opening in the ice where the rushing water of the river could be plainly seen from the bank, says the Scotsman. At the edge he stopped, turned, followed his tracks back to the bank and then ran some distance down the stream and sat there. Soon a dog came crashing out of the woods, baying finely, hot on the fox's trail. Now, dogs when on a chase of this kind trust almost entirely to their noses. This one was no exception. He ran along the ice, head down, and when he reached the hole he could not stop, but plunged into the water and disappeared forever. Then the fox trotted away with every sign of satisfaction.

The Prettiest Feet

A Swiss professor named Redorta states that not one woman in a score has a perfect foot owing to the wearing of high heeled boots and pointed toe shoes. German, American, Austrian and Dutch women, he says, have broad feet, while those of Englishwomen are too narrow to fulfill classical and healthy conditions. The women of the Latin races, excluding Frenchwomen, have the best formed and therefore the prettiest feet, the professor says.
