various legislatures will—and have—put up."

M. Harran, Magnolia, Ky.: "I have not voted for four or five years because there is no one to represent my principles. I would rather vote for what I want and fail, than to vote for what I do not want and succeed. . . I am today as strong in my faith of populism as I ever was. The party may die, but its principles are as enduring as the granite hills."

John L. Mooney, Slayden, Tex.: "I esteem it an honor to be enrolled as

a member of the Old Guard of Populism, even though I am only able to stand up and be counted one of them. Am one of the boys who wore the gray from 1861 to 1865. Voted with the democrats—many times under mental protest—until 1892. Was in the people's party state convention in 1892 that nominated T. L. Nugent for governor of Texas; in the Omaha convention that nominated J. B. Weaver for president; and stood with the 103 Texans who refused to vote for Bryan at St. Louis in 1896, but
