Regular enrollment seventh week, 106, representing 29 states and territories. "Special enrollment B," this week, 384. Total regular enrollment, 591, representing 41 states and territories. The Old Guard of Populism has now a foothold in every state and territory (aside from Alaska and "our insular possessions") except Connecticut, Delaware, Idaho, Maryland, Nevada, New Mexico, Rhode Island, South Carolina, and Wyoming. By next week, if possible, the regular enrollment will be rearranged by counties. It will show representation in about one-seventh of the counties of the United States. The three special enrollments, "A," "B," and "Indiana," aggregate 1,121 names.
