SECRETARY McBRIDE.

Mr. Charles Q. De France: Owing to ill health I was prevented from attending the Denver meeting, and feel that it will be impossible for the same cause to attend the St. Louis meeting next month. I find that you have from Michigan just two on your list, Messrs. Payne and Anthony, so I will thank you to make it three by adding my name.

You are doing a great work, but all of this talk about the "Cincinnati Plan" is misleading. Mr. Zabel presented it at the Nashville conference, and again at the Cincinnati conference of September 5, 1893, and at the Cincinnati convention of May 2, 1900. It was adopted September 5, 1893, and May 10, 1900, and became the Cincinnati plan. It was prepared by the populists of Michigan, and adopted at their first mid-road state convention on February 14, 1897, and later at the state convention of June 21, 1938, and is printed in full in the American Sentinel of June 22, 1898, so that the Cincinnati plan published by you is properly the Michigan plan. The Streeter plan is for a division
