This shows an increase in appropriations of \$1,404,437.30 made by the republican legislature, over what it cost to run the state government under the populist administration. Note the enormous difference. It costs the people nearly a million and a half more to run the government for two years under republican rule than it did to run it for the same time under populist direction. This is waste-extravagance amounting to an average of \$15,604.85 for each county (according to size.) Are you ready to aid in stopping this extravagance?
