There is no question about sentiment from the standpoint of principles; the question is, can the organization and the party interest be revived?

Without expressing my personal opinion on this, I will only say that the Fourth of July celebration at Springfield will in all probability furnish an adequate answer.

**Populist State Convention.**

The electors of the people's independent party of Nebraska are hereby notified that a delegate convention of said party will be held in the city of Lincoln, Nebraska, on the 10th day of August, A. D. 1904, at 2 o'clock p. m. of said day, for the purposes following, to-wit:

1. To nominate eight persons as presidential electors for the candidates of the people's party, nominated at Springfield, Illinois, July 4, 1904; such

electors to be voted for at the general election in November, 1904.

2. To nominate candidates of said party for the following state offices, to-wit:

One candidate for governor.  
One candidate for lieutenant governor.  
One candidate for secretary of state.  
One candidate for auditor of public accounts.  
One candidate for state treasurer.
