"To the Populists of Tennessee: You are aware that our national convention, which met at Springfield, Ill., July 4, 1904, nominated the Hon. Thos, E. Watson, of Georgia, and the Hon. Thos. H. Tibbles of Nebraska for president and vice president in the pending campaign.

"The present attitude of the democratic and republican parties, their close alliance with plutocracy and complete subserviency to its demands, render imperative the continued existence of the people's party, in order that democratic principles and the liberties of the common people, if possible, may be preserved to the present and coming generations of the American people.

"As the state chairman of the old executive committee, I hereby call a mass convention of the populists of Tennessee to meet in the capitol at Nashville, Sept. 8, 1904, at 1:30 p. m., for the purpose of reorganization, the appointment of a state electoral ticket and such other business as may be necessary.
