Adolph Carnot, mentioned for president of France, is a brother of the murdered president of that name.

Mrs. Stoessel, wife of General Stoessel of Port Arthur fame, recently paid \$120,000 for a house in St. Petersburg.

General Pierron, who at Sedan burned the colors of the French regiments so that they might not fall into the hands of the Germans, has just died at Versailles.

The duke of Argyll was 60 years of age recently. During the last twenty-one years he has produced upwards of a dozen books, including the opera of "Diarmid" in the great jubilee year.

Dr. Marcus Fitcherbert-Wheatland, a colored physician of Newport, R. I., is recognized as New England's leading specialist in electro-therapeutics and the X-ray. In early life he was a shoemaker.

Sienkiewicz, the Polish author, who is confined to his own house for giving offense to the Russian government was one of the gifted coterie who in 1877 endeavored to establish a Utopian colony near Los Angeles, Cal.

Helen Longstreet, daughter of the famous general, has written in "Lee and Longstreet at High Tide" the story of the battle of Gettysburg, an answer to certain criticisms that have been leveled at her distinguished father.

Cameron Corbett, M. P., has made over to the city of Glasgow his large estate between Loch Goll and Loch Long to be a pleasure ground for the people with the proviso that no intoxicants shall be sold on the premises.

Charles J. Murphy of New York, formerly a foreign agent of the United States department of agriculture, has received from Emperor Nicholas of Russia the decoration of the order of St. Stanislaus. He is known as "Corncake" Murphy, because of his persistence in teaching the Europeans how to use corn for food.

President Loubet will be the first

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chief of the third republic to retire under normal conditions at the completion of his term. Thiers resigned. So did MacMahon, and though M. Grevy completed one term, he had to quit office before the expiration of his second. Carnot was murdered, Casimir-Perier left the Elysee in disgust, and Felix Faure's career was cut short by his sudden death.

Lieutenant Fitzhugh Lee, Jr., will take the place of Lieutenant Fortescue as assistant master of ceremonies during the social season at the White House. Fortescue is mentioned as a correspondent in the unsavory Taggart divorce case "and," the report says, "will be returned to his regiment when he gets home from Europe." Fortescue is a relative of the president.

Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Horace A. Taylor, who brought out John C. Spooner and groomed him for the senatorial race, and was indirectly responsible for the election of "Uncle Jerry Rusk three times as governor of Wisconsin, is the founder of a prosperous Wisconsin town and owns a great share of another. When a farmer lad, late in the fifties, he plunged into the Wisconsin forest, \$8 and a gun were all his worldly possessions, and his first vocation was driving a stage coach.

There is in prospect a controversy over the erection in Indianapolis of a statue of the late President Harrison. The citizens of Indianapolis desire to place the statue on the site where is to be built the new federal building. Secretary Shaw, of the treasury department, recently sent to Indianapolis J. Knox Taylor, supervising architect of the government, who reported that the base designed for the statue was so large that it would be inharmonious in such close proximity to the building, which is to cost \$1,500,000. Secretary Shaw inclines to his view, but Vice President Fairbanks has already signed the report of the statue commission approving the large base. Secretary Shaw told Vice President Fairbanks that if Senator Beveridge and Representative Overstreet, who also make their home in Indianapolis, would agree in approval of the large base he would direct that its erection be permitted despite

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its inharmonious proximity to the building. Representative Overstreet has declined to approve the large base. Senator Beveridge has not been heard from, but as a rule he and the vice president usually disagree regarding most Indiana matters.
