South Omaha, Neb., July 3.—The South Omaha cattle market is good and prices about on a level with Chicago. Values have been gradually increasing on all desirable killers for the past ten days. Grass cattle have also shown some improvement. Stockers and feeders are steady to strong.

bushels. Afloat for and in Europe decreased 1,000,000. Total supplies decreased 2,314,000.

Corn—United States and Canada, east of Rockies, increased 1,479,600.

Oats—United States and Canada, east of Rockies, decreased 189,000.
